FIRE COMPANY PLANS OCTOBER OPEN HOUSE



The Hampden Twp. Volunteer Fire Company's annual Open House, scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 15, will feature fire truck displays and vehicle extrication demonstrations. The event will be held from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Emergency Services Building on South Sporting Hill Road.

Doug Gochenaur, Fire Administration Officer, said other features will include fingerprinting for youngsters, ambulance displays, the Fire Museum of Pennsylvania, truck rides, hands-on fire extinguisher demonstrations, a smoke house, emergency service dogs and food and beverages.

Recyclables: Where Do They Go?

It's a question that piques the curiosity of many Township residents. What happens to the 7,000 to 8,000 tons of recyclable items York Waste Disposal picks up every year from the more than 10,000 Township households and commercial establishments?

Rest assured, the items are actually being recycled.

The bottles, cans, plastics and newspapers placed at curbside wind up that same day at Recycle America in Lower Windsor Twp., York County, where they are separated and sorted.

Ralph Amato, York Waste Disposal's Municipal Manager, says the metal and clear glass are eventually melted down and recycled back into bottles and cans.

Because there is less of a market for green glass it is crushed and used for road surfaces and in certain construction work, Amato said. Most plastic is recycled for insulation used in homes and some garments.

Corrugated cardboard is recycled back into cardboard, while newspapers are crushed and recycled into paper products.

Amato said when recycling started around 1990, York Waste Disposal made a profit on recyclables: 4 cents a pound, for example, for clear glass. "Now, because of a glut of recyclables on the market, we pay," he said.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Commissioners took the following actions at recent meetings:

- ♦ Approved the preliminary/final land development plan for the proposed new Shaull Elementary School on a 28-acre site off the Wertzville Road, but rejected the Cumberland Valley School District's request for two waivers concerning street widths and street intersections, which are part of the project.
- ♦ Reaffirmed its opposition to the allocation of new funds for the Corridor One Regional Rail project and its support of the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners' position on the project. It also authorized the Township Manager to write to Gov. Edward Rendell to communicate its position.
- ♦ Awarded a \$172,402 contract to Handwerk, Inc., Hummelstown, for the paving of various Township streets.
- ♦ Awarded a \$58,410 contract to B&R Construction Services of Harrisburg to install curb cuts for handicapped access.
- ♦ Approved an application to the State Department of Transportation for a permit to install and operate traffic signals at Wertzville and Lamb's Gap Roads.
- ♦ Approved free pool memberships for the immediate family of soldiers serving in a combat zone.
- ♦ Asked the staff to re-evaluate a proposed ordinance to install "no parking" signs on both sides of Conodoguinet Avenue, south from the Carlisle Pike for a length of 215 feet.
- ♦ Adopted an ordinance to provide for the assessment of attorney fees incurred in the collection of a delinquent sewer or trash account.
- ♦ Authorized the purchase, under a state contract, of a \$15,000 TriPlex mower for Armitage Golf Club, and authorized the advertising for bids William E. Judge to replace and install new cart paths on hole numbers 6 and 7.
- ♦ Approved the sale of a 1996 Athey Top-Gun mechanical street sweeper to Michael B. Stoner, Inc., Mechanicsburg, for the high bid of \$22,500, and a Toro Reelmaster seven-unit gang mower to Melvin Campbell of Duncannon for \$1,151, the sole bid received.
- ♦ Authorized the purchase of an SUV, under a joint purchasing contract, up to a cost of \$30,000.
- ♦ Approved an intermunicipal agreement with the Township Sewer Authority and East Pennsboro Twp.
- ♦ Adopted a resolution recognizing Colin C. Needham "for his exemplary service as a Junior Commissioner."
- ♦ Adopted a resolution recognizing and congratulating Daniel J. Grimme on achieving the rank of Eagle Scout.

CV, Trinity Students Named Junior Commissioners

Daniel J. Tarvin, a senior at Cumberland Valley High School, and Parisa Zarreii, a junior at Trinity High School, have been chosen to serve as Junior Commissioners on the Township Board of Commissioners in the 2005-06 school year.

The two students, residents of Hampden Twp., are "A" students and have expressed a strong interest in local government.

Tarvin, who worked for the Republican State Committee of Pennsylvania in the fall of 2004, said he has "a desire to improve how our government works, a hard-working can-do spirit and the ability to work with others to accomplish a goal."

Besides his work on the Republican Committee, he is a soccer referee during the fall and spring, the incoming president of the Cumberland Valley Teenage Republicans and a member of the German Club, Key Club and Christian Club.

Ms. Zarreii, who ranks 10th in her class of 142 students, said she wanted to be a Junior Commissioner since she first heard of the program. She said, as Junior Commissioner, she will have representatives in each Hampden school disseminate information from Board of Commissioners' meetings "or I (will) visit the schools myself to do it." She said she will also distribute copies of her notes and the meeting minutes to all local and school libraries and will leave suggestion boxes at the schools.

Ms. Zarreii is a member of Trinity's Capitol Area Quiz Bowl Team, the Computer Lab Aides, editor of the student newspaper and literary magazine and a member of the school's Speech Team, Latin Club and French Club.

RT. 581 INTERCHANGE STILL TOP PRIORITY IN TOWNSHIP

Township Commissioners have revised the 12-year highway priority list but, as in previous recommendations to the Harrisburg Area Transportation Study, the top priority remains a proposed interchange at Rt. 581 and St. John's Church Road.

Unlike in their 2003 recommendations, Commissioners have placed the widening of the Carlisle Pike to four lanes, from Camp Hill to the Rt. 581 connector, as the second highest priority. The Pike carries more than 30,000 vehicles a day and is a major traffic bottleneck.

The improvement project at I-81 and the Wertzville Road (Rt. 944) was dropped to third on the list of 10 recommendations. That federally assisted project calls for the widening of Wertzville Road and off ramps in the interchange to improve traffic flow in the Cumberland Technology Park area.

The proposed interchange at Rt. 581 and St. John's Church Road would add an eastbound off ramp and a westbound on ramp to Rt. 581 and would provide direct access to the highway from Hampden's Industrial Park. Trucks and cars now use the Carlisle Pike and Trindle Road to reach the Rt. 581 connector to I-81.

Following is the rest of the revised list of priorities:

- ♦ Widen the Carlisle Pike from Silver Spring Twp. to east of Salem Church Road, connecting North Salem Church Road to Lamb's Gap Road and eliminating the offset intersection of the Carlisle Pike, Silver Spring Road and Lamb's Gap Road. Included also are traffic signals for the Lamb's Gap and Creekview Roads intersection.
- ♦ Improve the intersection of Lamb's Gap Road and the Wertzville Road by adding turning lanes, flattening the crest of the road and installing traffic signals.
- ♦ Widen Sheely Lane, from Trindle Road to Simpson Ferry Road. The road, which carries 8,800 vehicles a day, is a main route from the Navy Depot to Rt. 15 south.
- ♦ Widen Sporting Hill Road to three lanes, from Trindle Road to the Carlisle Pike. Sporting Hill is the main route to the Navy Depot and the Township Police Department and Emergency Services Building.
- ♦ Widen Trindle Road to four lanes from Camp Hill to Sporting Hill Road.
- ♦ Widen Wertzville Road to four lanes from Valley Road to East Penn Drive in East Pennsboro Twp. The daily traffic flow averages 10,000 to 13,000 vehicles.
- ♦ Conduct a feasibility study of Good Hope Road, from the Conodoguinet Creek to Wertzville Road to determine what improvements can be made.

Under Pennsylvania Act 101, municipalities with a population over 5,000 must recycle, which produces thousands of tons of material weekly.

The benefits, however, outweigh the cost, Amato pointed out. For one thing, he said, it helps the environment, saves resources and extends the life of landfills.

And, he added, "it's cheaper to pay to recycle than it is to pay disposal charges at a landfill, even though we have to add a truck and personnel to pick up the recyclables."

The recycling service also extends to certain bulk items, which are picked up free of charge under the contract with Hampden. Appliances are recycled, Amato said, after freon is removed at a licensed center.

Hampden residents pay just over \$13 a month for curbside trash and recyclables removal and bulk pickups. York Waste also picks up yard waste from March to October and delivers it to the Township's yard waste recycling facility.

The benefits of recycling, Township Commissioners believe, is well worth the minimal cost residents are charged for the service.
