

Ambulance Service Needs The Help of All Residents

Hampden Twp.'s Emergency Medical Services, which answered more than 2,500 calls for help in 2008, has begun its annual drive for family/individual subscriptions and donations to finance operations for the 12-month period beginning Sept. 1.

The EMS organization provides emergency medical coverage 24 hours a day, seven days a week to residents and visitors of the Town-

ship and neighboring Shiremanstown and other commu-



Holiday Trash Collection

The collection of trash and recyclables will be collected a day late the week of Sept. 7 because of the Labor Day holiday.

Residents are asked to place trash in weatherproof containers **on or behind the curb** before 6:30 a.m. the day of their trash collection, but no earlier than 6 p.m. the night before, to ensure it will be picked up.

Recyclables are to be placed in containers provided by the Township. **Containers should not be placed on a roadway**.

Curbside collection of bundled yard waste will continue until Oct. 31. Tree limbs cut into lengths of up to six feet and bundled for one person to carry will be picked up during regular trash collection by a different truck.

York Waste has announced that it will now pick up corrugated cardboard that is flattened and bundled and doesn't exceed 3 feet by 3 feet in size. The cardboard will be collected with recyclables.

nities. Subscribers also receive service from West Shore Advanced Life Support (ALS).

Annual membership fees are \$65 for a household and \$60 for an individual. The fee provides unlimited emergency calls for residents and ALS. The Township also partially funds operational expenses.

Additional services include lectures on EMS, ambulance

demonstrations, standby services for community activities and free blood pressure screenings.

William Cook, who heads the EMS Department, said despite reductions in reimbursements from insurance companies and Medicare, subscribers will see no changes in coverage.

The EMS, he said, depends on annual subscriptions "to provide a consistently high standard of around-the-clock emergency medical services."

Cook said a fully equipped Township ambulance costs approximately \$210,000 and is staffed by specially trained EMS professionals, who are continually educated on how to manage all types of emergency medical and traumarelated situations.

The Township EMS, founded in 1975 and licensed by the State Department of Health, now has a crew stationed at the Emergency Services Building North on Good Hope Road, in addition to its headquarters station on Sporting Hill Road.

Recycling Update From York Waste

York Waste, the Township's collector of trash and recyclables, has updated the list of items that residents, who are billed by the Township, can recycle (Please place in recyling container.):

- Aluminum food and beverage containers (please rinse; labels do not have to be removed)
- Plastic containers with symbols 1 through 7.
- Glass (clear, brown, green) food and beverage containers (please rinse and remove lids; labels do not have to be removed)
- Empty aerosol cans



- Newsprint, including slick inserts, magazines, catalogs, junk mail
- Construction paper, cereal and food boxes, or similar
- Printer paper, computer paper, copy paper
- Telephone books
- Corrugated cardboard please flatten and cut into pieces no larger than 3 feet by 3 feet and bundled.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS MAY NOT BE RECYCLED:

- · Wax coated paper
- Materials with food debris
- Plastic bags
- Batteries
- Styrofoam
- Light bulbs
- Mirrors, window/auto glass, ceramics, cookware, bake ware, drinking glasses
- Wood
- Unnumbered plastics
- Coat hangers
- Appliances
- Hazardous or toxic substances.

Trim Branches Now

Township residents are reminded that they must maintain a minimum height of eight feet between tree limbs and sidewalks on their property and 12.5 feet between limbs and a roadway.

The trimming is required to ensure the safety of residents and emergency personnel.

Tree limbs, cut in lengths of up to six feet and bundled for one person to carry, will be picked up during the regular weekly trash collection until Oct. 31 or can be dropped off at the Township's Yard Waste Recycling Facility, which is open from 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays and from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. the first and third Saturday of the month, April to the first weekend in January.

A limited number of tree pruners are available for checkout at the Highway Department garage. Call 761-0119 for more information.

Township Ends Delivery Of Tanbark, Compost

The Township has exhausted its supply of leaf compost and tanbark for delivery to residents. Limited quantities of tanbark are available, free of charge, at the Yard Waste Facility for pick up by residents.

The facility is accessible from Technology Parkway in the Cumberland Technology Park. Township staff will not load the material for the resident.

Photo ID Card Required For Resident Discounts

The Township's Resident ID Card, which is used for discount rates at the pool and Armitage Golf Course, can be obtained, free of charge, at the Recreation Department, 5001 Park Street Extended, across from Sporting Hill Elementary School. The card is also required to use the Township's yard waste collection facility.

The Recreation Department is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The card entitles a resident to \$4 off greens fees and \$1 off golf cart fees at Armitage, and \$2 off daily admission fees at the pool on weekdays and \$5 on weekends.

Township Commissioners are reminding residents that the use of motorized vehicles (bicycles, scooters, etc.) is prohibited on bike/walking paths and sidewalks in the Township. Not only is their use unsafe, they said, but it is a violation of state law.

Motor scooter includes small motorcycles, mini-bikes, mini-cycles, pocket bikes and pocket rockets, as well as motorized standing scooters. State law requires that a motor scooter must be registered, inspected and insured before it can be operated on a public road.
