



POLICE AWARDED ACCREDITATION STATUS

The Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC) has awarded accreditation status to the Township Police Department, which has been striving for the honor for the past four years.

The PLEAC, an arm of the Pennsylvania Police Chiefs Association, announced the decision after it met on Sept. 22 in Harrisburg.

The Department is only the third in Cumberland County to receive accreditation and the 65th in the state.

Lower Allen Twp. and Camp Hill Police Departments received accreditation in recent years.

Police Chief Michael Andreoli said the Department started working toward accreditation in 2005, having its facilities upgraded, policies rewritten and meeting 131 standards and many substandards as part of the accreditation process. "I can't say enough about how hard officers here had to work over the past four years to accomplish what we did. I am very proud of them."

He said a PLEAC on-site team spent two days assessing the Department in late August, inspecting all facilities, including the evidence room and temporary holding areas, and even riding along with officers on patrol.

He said the assessors checked the way reports are written, the Department's response methods, the collecting and inventory of evidence and the transportation of prisoners. The team, he said, was comprised of officers from around the state.

The benefits of the accreditation, Chief Andreoli, said:

- ◆ Reduces Department risk and exposure to lawsuits.
- ◆ Develops improved methods for providing services to the community.
- ◆ Decreases some liability insurance expenditures.

The accreditation is valid for three years, when the Department will have to be recertified.



2009-10 Township Snow Emergency Policy

The Township has announced its 2009-10 Snow and Ice Emergency Policy. Residents are asked to review the following policy highlights.

- A “general” or “limited” snow emergency will be declared whenever street conditions are dangerous because of snow accumulation.
- A “limited” emergency normally will be called when eight or more inches of snow are forecast. The emergency will continue for 24 hours after the snowfall ends or until canceled by the Township Manager.
- A “general” emergency will be declared under dire blizzard conditions.
- Vehicles traveling the Township during a general emergency snowstorm (blizzard-like conditions) must have four-wheel drive capability or be equipped with chains or snow tires (all-season radial tires are not considered snow tires).
- **The parking of vehicles on any street, road or highway during a general or limited emergency is prohibited.**

FOLLOWING ARE SNOW REMOVAL PRIORITIES:

- Residents who live on streets that have not been dedicated to the Township are advised that **those streets will not be plowed by the Township.** Snow removal is the responsibility of the developer.
- Plowing will begin when the snow is three inches deep.
- Top priorities are the main roads, including Orr’s Bridge Road, Good Hope Road, Lamb’s Gap Road, Creekview Road, Central Boulevard, Erb’s Bridge Road and Skyport Road.
- After the main roads are clear and remain passable, road crews will attempt to open the principle

access road to each development. However, if the main roads require additional attention, development plowing may have to be halted. After the snow has stopped falling, plows will return to the developments to make a pass on the roads in each direction. Once all development roads are open, plows will return to widen the road, if possible, to the curb.

- Residents can help in three ways: Don’t travel unless necessary; **don’t shovel or blow snow onto plowed or treated streets** (the Township has an ordinance that prohibits this, under penalty of law); **and move your car off the street so that plows have more room to operate.** This is especially critical in cul-de-sacs.
- Residents can also help by removing snow from fire hydrants near their property.

Holiday Trash Collection

The collection of trash and recyclables will be collected on the normal schedule on Veterans’ Day, Nov. 11. Because of the Thanksgiving holiday on Thursday, Nov. 26, trash and recyclables normally collected on Thursday will be collected Friday. Friday’s will be collected on Saturday.

Residents are asked to place trash in weatherproof containers **on or behind the curb** before 6:30 a.m. the day of their trash collection, but no earlier than 6 p.m. the night before, to ensure it will be picked up.

Recyclables are to be placed in containers provided by the Township. **Containers should not be placed on a roadway.**

Curbside collection of bundled yard waste will end on Oct. 30.

Leaf Collection to Begin in Mid-October

The Township will begin collecting leaves in mid-October and will continue until Nov. 25, the day before Thanksgiving, weather permitting.

Residents are asked to rake leaves into the street, a foot or so away from the curb or edge of pavement. Piles should not exceed three feet in height and four feet in width. Piles that contain tree branches or any other debris **WILL NOT BE PICKED UP** until the debris is removed. Debris damages equipment, and repairs are costly.

Residents are also asked to park vehicles away from leaf piles. Leaves that are raked into the street after the equipment passes may not be picked up until the following week.

Here is the collection schedule, which may vary depending upon the amount of leaves and weather conditions:

MONDAY – Pinebrook, Hollywood, Country Club Park, Countryside, Chestnut Hills and Brentwater.

TUESDAY – Point Ridge Farms, Indian Creek (including Good Hope Road), Pinebrook Heights and Good Hope Farms North and South.

WEDNESDAY – Ridgeland, Silver Brook and all areas south of the Carlisle Pike: Salem Park, Forrest Acres, Delbrook Manor, St. Mark's Place, Michael E. Souder Clearview Estates, Oakwood Park, Hampden Gardens and Trindle Road.

THURSDAY – Golfview, Laurel Hills, Deimler Manor, Hampden Square, Highlands, Kingswood and Creekview Road, Governor's Glen, Mountain View Road, Sears Run Road, Grandon Farms, Whelan Crossing and Wertzville Road, east of I-81.

FRIDAY – Noll Acres, Hampden Court, Westover, Millbank Estates, Hampden Heights, Glenwood Farms, Bunker Hills, Regency Hills, Hampden Hearth, Creekview, Turnberry, Signal Hill, Pinehurst, Glenda Crest, Ashford Village, Westbury, Wellington, Greenwood Circle, Dove Ridge, Pinehurst Hills, Fairwinds, Hampden Summit, Towns of Cross Creek and all roads west of Good Hope and north of the Conodoguinet Creek.

Replace Old Detectors

Smoke detectors that have been in your home for more than 10 years should probably be replaced, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

The NFPA said that its studies indicate that older residential smoke detectors have a 30 percent probability of failure within the first 10 years. Unless you know the detectors are new it is recommended to replace them when moving into a new house.
