



Commissioners Establish Veterans Memorial Committee

The Township Board of Commissioners has established a seven-member Veterans Recognition Committee that will spearhead efforts to create a veterans' memorial in the Township.

The Board acted unanimously on a resolution proposed by Commissioner Nathan Silcox, who feels strongly that the Township needs to do something, whether it be a memorial or a Veterans' Day parade, to honor the sacrifice of those who served our nation. "When I heard about Silver Spring Twp.'s Veterans Memorial Committee I believed it was an idea worth replicating here," Silcox said.

Committee members, who will be appointed by the Board of Commissioners, will consider a variety of ways the Township can honor its veterans, such as a memorial, recognition events, or a website. The Committee will make recommendations to the Board on how best to recognize our veterans.

Commissioner Silcox said "it is important for us to recognize our veterans' community so that the stories of those who served and sacrificed in times of war will be told to future generations. As President Ronald Reagan said, 'May we never take our freedom for granted. What

has been earned on the battlefield, and forever preserved by those who have gone before us, we pause in reverence and respect... We will always remember. We will always be proud. We will always be prepared, so that we always may be free."

Residents who have an interest in serving on the Memorial Committee can submit a letter indicating their desire to serve and a resume outlining their experience and accomplishments. The letter can be sent to Hampden Township, 230 S. Sporting Hill Road, Mechanicsburg 17050. The application deadline will be July 15.

CASINO REVIEW WILL TAKE MONTHS

Hampden Twp. Commissioners were advised by officials of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board (GCB) that a "thorough review of the application and a determination of eligibility" for a proposed Category 3 casino at the Holiday Inn West on the Carlisle Pike could take many months.

Al Bienstock, President of the Township's Board of Commissioners, said that if the application process moves forward the GCB would conduct an in-depth background investigation on the corporate entities and the principals associated with the proposed casino.

He said the GCB is responsible for deciding which

applicant will be selected. The GCB will hold a public hearing in the Township to take testimony on the possible impact of the casino to the area.

The GCB said there is just one Category 3 license available in the state, and the Holiday Inn application is one of four submitted.

Bienstock said Commissioners, staff and the GCB met in April to discuss the application.

A Category 3 casino is limited to registered overnight guests or individuals who have paid for hotel resort amenities. Larger casinos, such as the one at

Carlisle Pike Work To End in Late July

The repaving of almost a mile of the Carlisle Pike, from just east of the Salem Church Road intersection to near the Van Patton Drive intersection, is expected to be completed by the end of July, according to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation.

The state-financed project, which began in March, includes road milling and replacement of the surface.

Lane closures are scheduled from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. One lane of traffic will be open on each side.

nearby Penn National, have no such restrictions as to who can gamble at the facility.

The State Gaming Act mandates that a Category 3 casino can operate up to 600 slot machines and 50 table games, have no fewer than 275 guest rooms under common ownership and have substantial year-round recreational guest amenities.

The property owner also would have to obtain necessary permits from the Township to construct a casino.

The GCB said there is no timetable for it to make a decision on who receives the casino license. Bienstock said Commissioners and staff will continue to meet with state officials and hotel principals and will keep residents informed.

Commercial/Industrial Recycling

All commercial, industrial and institutional establishments are required, under state and Township regulations, to establish a collection system for recyclable materials.

The materials that must be collected are high-grade office paper, corrugated paper and aluminum. All haulers and recyclers Jerome Kaczmarowski operating in the Township are required to provide to the Cumberland County Recycling and Waste Authority a quarterly recycling report on the specific form provided by the County.

Police Increase Hours For Night Appointments

In an effort to better use police manpower more efficiently, Police Chief Harry Clay has announced that, effective immediately, residents can make appointments with the Police Department after regular office hours.

Regular office hours are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday.

Residents can call the Department at 761-2609 during regular office hours to make an appointment. If they need police assistance in a non-emergency situation they can call the Cumberland County non-emergency number, 238-9676. Residents who come to the police station for assistance can use the phone on the wall inside the police entrance and follow posted instructions to summon a police officer to return to the station.

(Residents are reminded to call 911 in case of an emergency.)

Compost Delivery Available

The Township no longer has tanbark available for delivery but still has a limited quantity of leaf compost available for delivery or pickup by residents. Orders for leaf compost will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

The delivery charge is \$75 for any amount between one and eight cubic yards. The compost will only be placed on the driveway of the property.

Tanbark and compost are also available, free of charge, from 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, and the first and third Saturday of each month from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Yard Waste Facility at the Public Works complex, which is at 1955 Technology Parkway. A resident ID card will be required to access the facility. Check the Township website for updates on the future availability of tanbark orders for delivery.

Residents who want the delivery service must complete a release agreement and make payment at the Township Building. The agreement form is available at the Township Building or on the Township website under "on-line forms."

Dog, Cat Warning Issued

Township officials are reminding residents to keep their pets leashed, to clean up after them if they are off their private property and to prevent them from making noise that disturbs other residents.

Residents are also asked to refrain from leaving food outside for animals, as this practice can attract unwanted animals, such as feral cats, skunks, possums, etc.

Township regulations require that unleashed dogs and cats must not stray off their owner's property, run at large in the Township or defile another person's property.

Violation of the regulation may carry a fine of up to \$600 plus costs.
